Trevor suffered a heart attack in May, just before the Annual Meeting and decided that it was right for him to step down from these demanding positions. It was a privilege and an honour to make my first field appointments to Paul 'Cyril' Filby, at PJK Lodge and at Suffolk Installed Principal's Chapter, as Provincial Grand Secretary and Scribe E. Such a big change in the 'operations department' ensured that there was much to do during hand-over, however we are on course to restart our season well-rested after the recess and to continue with the progress that we have been making all year.

I look forward to seeing you in your Lodges and Chapters in the coming months and hearing about your plans to help us achieve our various goals, foremost of which is to ensure that we are having fun.

NAMCSS Elect a new Chairman

The National Association of Masonic Clay Shooting Societies was formed at Great Queen's Street in London in 2016, where twelve founding provinces from all round the country were represented, including Suffolk. The executive committee elected at that meeting were Chairman Brian Saidman (Met Grand Lodge), Vice Chairman Mike Casey (West Lancs), Secretary Roger Wilkes (East Kent) and Treasurer Nick Jenkins (West



Kent). The purpose of the society was to bring together the many individual masonic clay shooting societies around the country and to standardise the annual National Championships which had, up to that point, not been publicised throughout the country.

Since then, the society has increased its membership to over three quarters of the provinces in England and Wales and oversees both the annual National Championships, to be held in Sussex in 2025, and the Biannual International Championships, to be held in Jersey in 2025. A standard format for the event has been established and each year NAMCSS invites interested provinces to apply to host the competitions and offers friendly and experienced advice on how they should be run.

In 2019 the National was held in Suffolk and over two hundred shooters from all around the country travelled to High Lodge Shooting School near Yoxford for the event, hosted by the Suffolk Masonic Clay Shooting Society. SMaCSS was formed in 2008 by Roger Nash (Chairman) Ruffy Ruffles, Phil Ramsey, Shane and Lisa Brereton, and has held social shoots in Suffolk several times each year ever since, raising many thousands of pounds for local charities and the masonic Festival Scheme. In 2023 Brian Saidman announced his intention to stand down as NAMCSS Chairman, and following a ballot held at the AGM in 2024 Roger Nash was declared his successor by an almost unanimous vote. As Chairman, Roger's role will be to further increase the number of provinces represented on NAMCSS, and to visit many of the numerous provincial shoots held every year all around the country.

Council for Freemasonry in England and Wales – Underpinning the Continued Progress of Freemasonry

In an unprecedented and historic move to dispel misconceptions and address challenges, English Freemasonry has announced the creation of the Council for Freemasonry,



representing women masons, as well as the men, in England and Wales.

This new Council aims to enhance further existing and longstanding collaboration and promote the fundamental principles of Freemasonry, including merit, tolerance, diversity, and inclusion, between the United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE), the Order of Women Freemasons (OWF), and the Honourable Fraternity of Ancient Freemasons (HFAF).



Even in 2024 Freemasonry continues to face various unfounded criticisms and inaccurate misconceptions, often stemming from deeprooted prejudices, or preconceived falsehoods. Contrary to the erroneous claim that Freemasonry is exclusively male, women's Freemasonry has been an integral part of Freemasonry in the UK for over a century. While Freemasonry is practised in single-sex Lodges, this is no different from many other activities, including most sports as well as many other community groups.

The establishment of the Council for Freemasonry will formally establish an overarching forum for collaboration. In addition, the Council will bring together the community service ambitions of all three bodies, coordinate communication and engagement with other organisations, drive the membership growth ambitions, particularly for women Freemasons, and allocate resources and facilities for the general benefit of both male and female Freemasonry.

The Council will include the heads of each Grand Lodge, and each Grand Lodge will provide the President for a twelve-month period, chairing Council meetings in strict rotation. The President for the first two years will come from the OWF and HFAF, with UGLE covering the third year.

The formation of the Council for Freemasonry in England and Wales marks a pivotal step towards enhancing cooperation, addressing misconceptions, and promoting the values of Freemasonry. This historic initiative reaffirms Freemasonry's commitment to integrity, friendship, respect and service, while keeping community service and charitable giving at the absolute forefront of this historic organisation.

Composite make donation to the British Heart Foundation

As last year's WM of Composite Lodge No. 9480, I decided to donate the majority of the funds raised during my year to the British Heart Foundation. The £1,000 raised included profits made from our



Summer Event and Ladies Night which was held at Hintlesham Golf Club, along with monies given by members throughout the year and I was very pleased to present a cheque to Heather Hammond, the Manager of the BHF shop in The Buttermarket, Ipswich.

This charity is one very close to my heart due to my own mother very suddenly dying from a heart attack when only 51 back in 1973. According to latest statistics, there are currently 7.6m people living with some form of heart disease in the UK and every 3 minutes someone dies from heart or circulatory issue. This equates to 480 people every day.

Before the BHF existed, the majority of babies diagnosed with a serious heart defect in the UK did not reach their 1st birthday. Now, due to all the extensive research and treatments available, 80% survive to adulthood.

Unknowingly to me, I lived with a hole in the heart until I was 18, when it was diagnosed and treated about 6 months after the premature death of my mother. In a way, I was one of the lucky ones and owe a great deal to the doctors at Papworth Hospital and also the BHF.

Festival 29 Skydive

Charity may be the distinguishing characteristic of a Freemason's heart, but most of the time it doesn't mean ignoring common sense – the kind of common sense that restricts us from jumping out of a moving aeroplane midflight, for example. However, for a number of Suffolk Freemasons including Provincial Grand Master, Jolyon Berry they set out to take Suffolk's 2029 Festival to new heights.

In this case, it was a height of 14,000 feet, from which the 25 volunteers took part in a sponsored skydive to raise money for the 2029 Festival. It was the culmination of almost six months of planning, fundraising and - for some of our members - careful dieting to meet the weight requirements of the skydiving crew!

On Thursday 27 June, the group met at Beccles Airfield in the north of Suffolk, where the experienced team at Virage Aviation began preparing each of them for the tandem jump. Nerves were calmed, or were at least until the jumpers were told they would be reaching speeds of I 20mph on their descent, although not one of the volunteers abandoned the jump.

Before long the aircraft began lifting off from the airfield, climbing over the Suffolk countryside as final checks were made. A short flight didn't give the volunteers too long to dwell on what they had agreed to do before the first, strapped closely to their instructor, leapt from the door and began their descent.

It took a few minutes for each of the jumpers to reach the ground, but to those taking part there was scarcely time to take in the 120mph plunge, the sudden deceleration as the ripcord pulled them back to just 12mph within four seconds and the rollercoaster sensation of dipping and turning on the remaining descent with the chute open above their heads. Happily all 25 landed safely and with a smile on their faces.

Provincial Grand Master Jolyon Berry said: "It's impossible to know what to expect when you're first made Provincial Grand Master, but I suspect very few of my fellow PGM's had a skydive sitting in their in-tray almost as soon as the collar was placed on their shoulders! It's been a fantastic few months raising funds for the jump, and I couldn't have asked for a warmer or more supportive response from our Masonic community in Suffolk.

"Many times since, people have asked 'did you enjoy it? Was it fun?'. Well watching people slip from the relative security of a light aircraft and falling out of sight, then leaning out of the door, falling vertically for 1,500ft with the skin on my bare arms rippling like a wave on water and with every attempt to smile making my cheeks blow out was not simply fun or enjoyable - it was life-affirming. It was awesome. It was unimaginable and unforgettable.

"A huge thank you to everyone who supported us, from those who donated to the amazing crew at Virage Air who took us through the jump. I can't wait to see what comes next in our Festival plans, and I know Suffolk will beat it's previous fundraising record into the dust."

As a result of their efforts, the skydivers raised £18,200 for the Festival appeal, with that number continuing to tick up as late donations are made. These funds join the generous donations of Suffolk Freemasons towards the 2029 Festival, with over half a million pounds already pledged, setting the Province well on it's way towards the goal of beating the £1.6m raised in their 2019 Festival.

With five years to go, the adrenaline high of the skydive is just the beginning, with brave or perhaps foolhardy members being invited to raise funds by taking part in a firewalk next...

Suffolk Freemasons continue to support the Suffolk Punch Trust

Over the last 3-4 years a team of Suffolk Masons led by Barry Bloomfield have committed themselves to assisting the Suffolk Punch Trust in their fundraising



efforts. Already the team has raised funds for a breeding facility, new site defibrillator and, more recently, has focused on improving their energy efficiency including the installation of multiple solar panels on the Visitor Centre roof with associated battery storage.

The team met with members of the Trustees to discuss ideas for future projects which would either improve revenue streams or reduce direct overheads. The clear outcome of this meeting, chaired by Bro Dr Berwyn Clarke was the significant concern regarding transport costs for the horses either for breeding purposes or to represent the Trust at agricultural shows throughout the UK.

In a remarkably short period Barry managed to identify a second-hand vehicle based in East Kent which was on the market for £25000. This vehicle has 9 stalls and can transport 5 Suffolk Punch horses at once as well as providing significant accommodation facilities for the staff with full camera coverage of the horse area for continuous monitoring.

The delivery of the vehicle itself, however, was only half the story because Trust staff then required registration and training courses to obtain the necessary HGV and animal transport licences to legally operate it. Much of this cost was kindly covered by funds raised by Lodge of Fidelity 555 and now two Trust employees and an additional volunteer are fully licenced and qualified to use the vehicle anytime and anywhere.



Masons who attended the fundraising BBQ at the Trust in June will have seen the PGM formally present the keys and witnessed the impressive red vehicle first hand.

It has been well used this summer - already saving around £10,000 in transport costs - with horses attending a variety of shows including the Norfolk show, Tendring show and the Suffolk Punch Extravaganza at BBC Countryfile Adam Henson's Cotswold Farm.

So, another milestone project successfully completed by the SPT masonic fundraising team Barry Bloomfield, Jimmy Jewell, Stu Bowers, Ole Krebs and Dr Berwyn Clarke but, also, important to recognise that this particular project was largely funded by non-masonic donations and for this we, and the Suffolk Punch Trust, are incredibly grateful.

Charlie was born in Ditchingham, Norfolk in 1957. Charlie's parents met in wartime and although his father originated from Wrexham and his mother being born in Kirby Cane, Horace and Lorna made their home at The Lodge, Kirby Cane

where Charlie spent his early childhood and in his teenage years moving to Ellingham so that the family could care for an elderly relative.

School years were at Ellingham Primary and Bungay Secondary Schools and being eligible to leave school at the age of 15 he considered joining one of the Forces, however not being able to join until the age of 17, his father encouraged him to attend Lowestoft College where Charlie completed an Engineering

Course resulting in him being offered a 5-Year Apprenticeship as a Trainee Electrical Engineer with the Eastern Electricity Board based at Finborough Hall, this enabled him to continue studying and to gain an ONC in Electrical and Mechanical Engineering and an HNC in Electrical and Electronic Engineering.

In 1980 Charlie left the Eastern Electricity Board and joined Fibrenyle, a plastic processing company, based in Ellough. Some 5 years later he was approached by the Owner of M & H Plastics, a very successful family-owned plastic processing company, to join their Engineering Team, where he remained until the end of 2021 retiring after 37 years as a Senior Manager. Charlie married Benita, who is a member of the Order of Women Freemasons, in 1979, they have two daughters, Ellen and Alison, both married with young families, one living in Cambridge and the other St Albans. Charlie and Benita have never moved house since marrying and live in Ringsfield, they would say 'the house doesn't change just gets updated!'

His introduction into freemasonry came from his father-in-law, W.Bro. William (Billy) Hall PPJGW, eventually being initiated into Apollo Lodge No. 305 in 1999, becoming Master in 2008 and then Secretary and thereafter Lodge Mentor, appointed as a Prov. G. Steward in 2015, 2 years later was asked to be Lodge Secretary of Suffolk Provincial Grand Stewards Lodge No. 9215 a post he held for 5 years, promoted to Prov. SGD in 2019 and Group 2 Rep. in 2022.

Outside of the Craft Lodges Charlie joined; St. Michael's Chapter No. 305 becoming First Principal in 2015, appointed as Prov. Steward in 2018 and Prov. DGDC in 2022; Lowestoft Lodge of Mark Master Masons No. 686 becoming Master in 2017, Prov. G. Steward in 2018, Prov. AGDC in 2021 and Prov. AG Secretary in 2023.

Masonry is not Charlie's only interest, he has been known to watch the occasional football match however his main interest is Formula One and Oval Racing or basically anything that has wheels, he enjoys the outdoor life and spending as much time as possible with the family and four grandsons.

I was born in September 1964 in Carshalton Hospital Surrey, and put up for adoption in October of that year. My adopted mum Maureen gave me the best of starts in life with family life and educational. I was mainly educated at Christ's Hospital School in Horsham,



Sussex but spent my last year at Sharnbrooke School in north Bedfordshire.

When my father retired from being a headmaster at a school in Bedford he and Mum decided to come to Suffolk to live and they moved to Reydon November in 1981, I followed in December of that year. As Dad was a Freemason in Bedford he subsequently became a Joining Member of Martyn Lodge in Southwold in 1982 and became Master in November 1990.

After Dad died in 1996 I decided it was time to trace my birth Mother, and in 1997 I began that search which turned out to be very successful as my birth parents married two years after putting me up for adoption and I have a further 3 brothers and a sister who are my blood siblings. Coincidentally, I have 3 sisters and a brother in my adopted family, they seem to mirror each other, and

In January 2002 when I became self employed, the first thing I did was to ask to become a Mason. Being on the milkround and working 6 days a week, I knew that there was no way I could go to a meeting on a Friday night then go to work straight after. And now the unexpected pleasure and honour of becoming Provincial Junior Grand Warden. I'm certainly looking forward to going around the Province and visiting lodges that I may not have been to and meeting Brethren along the way.

I only mentioned the adoption because life has many twists and turns that we all have to face and learn from and fate has brought me where I am today. Masonry has been a huge part of my life even when I didn't realise it, just as small boy seeing Dad disappear on a certain evening all suited and booted for some unknown reason!! Now I know! Wish he could see me now, I'm sure he would be immensely proud of his boy.

Rose Croix now open to all Master Masons of at least six months' standing

Are you thinking about your next step in freemasonry? Around the world, the second largest order after the Craft is the Ancient & Accepted Scottish Rite, consisting of thirty-three degrees. In England and Wales it is known as the Ancient and Accepted Rite, and is often referred



to as 'Rose Croix', because candidates join at the 18th degree, which has the formal title Prince Rose Croix of Heredom.

Building on what you have learnt in the three Craft degrees and the Royal Arch, the 18° ceremony considers the principles of brotherly love, relief and truth through deeper philosophical and spiritual teachings, guiding candidates towards a greater understanding of themselves and their connection to the universe. It is a ceremony unlike any other in freemasonry and is often described by candidates as their most profound experience since Initiation.

As the Royal Arch draws on themes from the Hebrew Bible (Old Testament), so the 18° draws upon various books of the New Testament, but you no longer have to be a Christian in order to join: the Order is now open to all Master Masons who will be of at least six months' standing at the time of their 'Perfection', as the joining ceremony is known. The ritual uses the life and teachings of Jesus to illustrate masonic virtues, which Christians will recognise as the basis of their own faith, but these virtues are shared by all the major world religions and the teachings are of contemporary relevance to all, regardless of their faith. Most Rose Croix chapters meet only three times a year, so membership is not a significant addition to your current masonic commitments, and the dues are among the lowest of any masonic Order. The Dean of the Cathedral has been a great friend of Suffolk Freemasonry and we are very grateful to have his support. Please put 3.30 Sunday 6th October 2024 in your diary.

I would like to thank, in advance, our Chapter Stewards, who will supporting the Evensong service and also thank them, belatedly, on behalf of all the province, for their wonderful efforts in making the provincial meeting such a success. The meeting will be our last at Venue 16, but possible one of the most successful. Thank you too, to the great team of DCs and active officers, led by Ex Comp James Orlopp for making the day run so smoothly. I am particularly grateful to outgoing Provincial Scribe E, Ex Comp Bob Heavisides for a monumental effort in co-ordinating the day ably assisted by Provincial Assistant Scribe E Ex Comp Graham Saward.

As many of you may know, Bob's successor, Ex Comp Trevor Tinley, has had to step back from the role for health reasons, but we are very pleased to welcome 'Cyril' Filby to the role. Ex Comp Andrew Pryke was appointed Active Scribe N in May and I am pleased to announce that our Most Excellent Grand Superintendent has asked Andrew to join the team of official visitors for the season ahead. I know that you will all extend him a warm welcome. I also congratulate Andrew

and Ex Comp Bob Heavisides and Ex Comp John Kirk for gaining Grand Rank appointments and promotionsall very well deserved.

Gippeswyk Lodge Banner Restoration



Before restoration

When Gippeswyk Lodge No 4254 came to life in April 1921, a lodge banner was commissioned by the Founders. The project was undertaken by the Ipswich School of Art under the watchful eye of the principal, who may, or may not have been a Freemason. The Anglo-Saxon name for - what is now Ipswich - was Gippeswyk, 'the settlement on the River Gipping'. For this reason, the design of the banner closely followed the coat of arms of the county town of Suffolk with masonic emblems included to strengthen the ties between the town and Freemasonry. Skilled artists and embroiderers set to work and produced our banner. It is a beautiful piece of work. The banner has served us well, with a little bit of TLC from time to time, for over 100 years, and has hung proudly at every meeting since the consecration of the lodge.

In January of this year disaster struck, the main structure collapsed. The internal panel on which the strength of the banner depended gave way which

resulted in the bottom fringe falling apart. We then discovered that the old silks on which much of the embroidery depended had rotted and the whole thing looked so sad.

The big question was, "What do we do now?" Several options were explored, including commissioning a new banner the same. This proved to be quite a challenge, as none of the alternatives came anywhere close to replicating the beautiful piece of art we had been used to. A much-loved Brother came forward and offered to pay for the restoration of the banner, an offer which was accepted with grateful thanks. Fortunately, we have, on our doorstep a company called Mary Collings Church Furnishings, who are experts in embroidery and make church vestments and many fine furnishings for churches of all denominations. They are renowned throughout the country and acknowledged as among the leading suppliers of ecclesiastical goods.

As it so happened, some years ago we had cause to have some remedial work carried out on our banner, and a former Provincial Grand Chaplain recommended Mary Collings to me. It therefore made sense to ask them to examine the banner and give us an opinion as to whether it could be restored. The advice was, to the effect that there was a 90%+ chance of a successful restoration, and that it would be possible to bring it back to life. Having made the decision to proceed, in late February the banner was entrusted to their care. Once again, fortune favoured us. Mary Collings was able to source the special silks from a well-known company in Sudbury, the colours being an almost perfect match for those that had rotted.

Specialist embroiderers were commissioned to work on the project, and the banner spent some time in London being worked on by

highly skilled ladies, one of whom had been involved in the remedial work some 20 years ago and remembered what she had done. We were kept updated on the progress of the work during the entire process, and in early May the banner was returned to us. It was magnificent. All the damaged panels had been replaced, the fringe renewed, the broken tassels repaired and the gold threads had been treated with a special preservative which should maintain their lustre. We were also given a photographic record of the work carried out during the restoration.


Sadly, our brother who had sponsored the restoration died suddenly a few days before the banner was returned to us, and at our meeting in May I had the honour to deliver his obituary oration as the banner hung proudly in our lodge once again.

We had a special cover made which was paid for by two of our brethren and will protect the banner when it is not in use, and we have resolved to ensure that it is kept in its cover, and that it will not leave Ipswich Masonic Hall again.

Brethren, our lodge banners, and artifacts are of great importance to us. You will no doubt recall that the Hebrews gathered under their respective banners during their journey from Egypt to the Promised Land under the leadership of Moses. So too do we assemble under the banners of our respective lodges, and hopefully we always will.

Our banners are special, and their cost considerable. The more ornate the design, the more they cost. On completion of the restoration, we were told, that should catastrophe befall us, and assuming the necessary embroidery skills were available, it would take around 18 months work to remake an exact replica and would cost - at today's prices - around £25,000. So, look after your treasures, they will not be easy, or cheap to replace.

What is a Festival?

STEWARD A festival is a fundraising appeal that is held to raise funds in support of the Masonic Charitable Foundation, MCF. The festival consists of an 'appeal' and a 'finale'. During the appeal, members are encouraged to donate, raise funds, participate in events, to learn about and promote the work of the charity, and join together for the benefit of the province, the members and the MCF. The result of the appeal is celebrated at a final event where the total amount raised through donations is announced and the achievements and activities of the province are celebrated. A festival is very much a partnership with the MCF. Through participation in every aspect of the festival, the MCF aims to work with the province to

deliver a successful outcome.

We receive grants, support and assistance from the MCF throughout the year, not just during the Festival. The amount of money we get back and the support we receive is often more than what we raise.

How does Suffolk get this money back?

We receive this money back by the grants and support which is accessed through the Prov Charity Steward, the Prov Almoner or by direct contact with the MCF. See the MCF website for further information on grants.

When does the Festival finish?

It started 1st January 2024 and is planned to finish in Summer 2029 with an event where all Masons and families will be welcome to celebrate our success.

Do we qualify for gift aid on our donations?

Yes, you can use the Festival relief chest then the gift aid is automatically paid in for you, straight into the relief chest.

Do we get interest on the money we donate?

We can receive up to 10% back in interest making it better than any bank.

What happened to the old masonic charities?

They were all combined and now operate under one umbrella, our own charity the MCF.

A Milestone for the Royal Order of Scotland in East Anglia

In 1923, a group of nine distinguished Freemasons, all of whom were members of the Royal Order of Scotland, decided that it would be advantageous to have a Provincial Grand Lodge of the Order closer to home and submitted a Petition to Grand Lodge. The Petition received favour, and after much endeavour the new Provincial Grand Lodge was Consecrated and Erected on the 30th of October 1924.

The first entry in the minute book read:

A special meeting of Grand Lodge was held in the Masonic Rooms, 47 St Giles Street, Norwich at 2 p.m. on Thursday, October 30th, 1924, presided over by R.W.Bro. Colonel The Right

Hon. The Earl of Kintore, Deputy Grand Master and Governor of the Order, who proclaimed:

By virtue of the power and authority of Grand Lodge, the counties of Norfolk, Suffolk, Cambridge and Huntingdon were constituted a Provincial Grand Lodge of the Royal Order of Scotland under the title and designation of the Provincial Grand Lodge of East Anglia.

During the early years the Lodge met at Ipswich in February, Cambridge in May and Norwich in November, usually with 2 Candidates for Advancement and Promotion at each meeting, but occasionally as many as 5. Since our consecration we have welcomed almost 500 Candidates.

The occupations of candidates is an interesting insight into the changing face of society. We have had an Ice manufacturer, tanner, rubber planter and money dealer in our Lodge, together with all the usual professions. There has also been the odd Police officer or two!

At the meeting of Provincial Grand Lodge held on the 10th of November 1939 at Norwich, the Provincial Grand Master stated that, following the declaration of hostilities with Germany and the difficulties in transport due to the shorter hours of daylight, he had decided not to hold the meeting in Ipswich in February. He hoped however to hold the meeting at Cambridge in May if circumstances permitted.

Several subsequent meetings were disrupted during the War years, including that of Friday 21st of May 1943 at the Lion Hotel, Cambridge, when the Provincial Grand Secretary, Bro. Jabez Ernest Albert Sorrell was installed as our 3rd Provincial Grand Master.

focused on the important issues of the day, such as subscription rates and provision of wine at the Festive Board and that the Lodge ledger had sustained damage in the 1953 east coast flood disaster and required re-binding.

The 1950s proved to be an important period in the history of the Province with the arrival of a joining member, Brother Norman Hackney.

Brother Hackney, fascinated by the ritual, started to delve into the origins of the Order and produced a booklet of 'notes' in 1951, copies of which he sent to a couple of distinguished Brethren.

A week or two later he received notification that the Grand Secretary was asking questions about his work and he, reluctantly, sent him a copy of his notes. He received a reply that the Grand Secretary had read his notes "with great interest" and passed them to the Grand Librarian for further examination.

Brother Hackney, now a PDPGM of the Province of East Anglia, received permission from Grand Lodge to produce the final version of his notes in 1967 on the understanding that they were to be in the personal keeping of Members of the Order. 100 copies were printed, two of which are held in the Provincial archive.

It is with profound regret that the minutes of the Lodge for the

period 1960 to 1990 cannot be traced and therefore there will inevitably be some gaps in our history, which underlines the necessity of maintaining an archive for use by future generations, especially as we move to more electronic records, and it is too easy to press a 'delete' button.

Along with the rest of society, Freemasonry was severely restricted by the onset of the Covid pandemic in 2020, with all meetings suspended. The situation gradually improved with meetings restored by the end of 2021.

And so, we turn full circle with 100 years of history, and we are making history today.

I believe that there has never been a centenary meeting of a Lodge anywhere where a member, who is older than the Lodge itself, still takes an active part in the Ceremony, Brother Alf Garner.

Brother Alf was Installed as our Provincial Grand Master by The Earl of Elgin and Kincardine - Deputy Grand Master and Governor, on the 30th of March 2007. On that occasion, the Deputy Grand Master and Governor was attended by the Grand Director of Ceremonies, Ewan Rutherford – who went on to become our current Deputy Grand Master and Governor and attended the centenary meeting held at Colchester on the 5th of April 2024.



The Suffolk Mobility Equipment (Loan) Scheme (SMES) was started at the Provincial Almoners Conference 2023. At that point, the principles were agreed but there was little flesh on the bones. Since last autumn, a lot of progress has been made and we can now formally launch the initiative. There are many people to thank for their support.

Objectives – The Suffolk Provincial Group Almoner Team will manage the Scheme and envisage that it will be similar to those operated successfully in Essex & Norfolk, enabling Brethren and dependants to borrow on loan free of charge, basic mobility aid equipment

The equipment must be clean, unaltered from its original manufactured specification and in good working order. We do not want motorised wheelchairs or medical beds. The Gatekeepers will have the right to turn away any equipment if it is judged to be "not fit for purpose." We hope you understand! Please contact your nearest Gatekeeper if you have any items.

When cousins visit...

Over 30 years ago, whilst earning a crust as a Long Melford Innkeeper I often played host to American visiting veterans and their families returning to the scene of their wartime home. The reunions with their



Suffolk hosts and the tales of their exploits and brave valour filled many an evening dinner or lunch. I was eventually to write an account of those times, "When Cousins Come to Stay" and their boundless sacrifices (they lost over 200 men from Sudbury alone), had a lasting effect on me. Then, in 2015, a masonic chum told me of a visit to East Lancashire where he had been deeply moved by an American ceremony of The Empty Chair, originally written to heal divisions after their Civil War.

I obtained a copy and rewrote this lovely piece setting it in an English Temple after that bloodiest of conflicts during 1914-19 when so many of our Brethren made the supreme sacrifice. Originally performed by my own Priory Lodge it was to be embraced by our own Provincial Stewards Lodge and has now been demonstrated by that very professional team of thespians many times from London to Northampton, always to fond acclaim and also raising a fair amount for charity, and will thus continue. As it has been written for the 'entertainment' of all, our ladies and guests have been there to somewhat enliven our evenings.



Now forward to the present day. Bill Dotesio Eyres was visiting a Lodge in Philadelphia and told them of our tableaux. They expressed interest and Bill thus informed me. I then again completely rewrote the script setting it

amongst those very veterans of the 486th USAF, based here in Sudbury, that I earlier mentioned. So, with a team of Suffolk masons we are visiting the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, with some ladies and non-masonic friends in November and perform. Suffolk Almoner Team & MCF come to the rescue

Bro Daniel Holmes, a military veteran and new member of Felix United Service Lodge, faced significant challenges after a lifealtering road accident in 2005 that resulted in the amputation of his leg. Living in Felixstowe with his wife Clare, their home was not adapted for his disability, prompting them to apply for grants from East Suffolk Council and military charities in 2021. After years of effort, they secured funding for home renovations and hired a local builder to commence work in March 2024.

However, the project quickly encountered issues. Costs escalated, and the quality of work was substandard. When they confronted the builder, he abandoned the job on May 16, 2024, leaving them without the necessary funds to complete the renovations, as he had received all grant money upfront. This left Daniel and Clare in a difficult position, needing to find alternative accommodation on short notice as their temporary caravan was required for holidaymakers.

Seeking assistance, Daniel contacted his Lodge Almoner, who facilitated an emergency application to the Suffolk Provincial Benevolent Fund. Within a week, they received a grant that helped secure accommodation. Clare then approached the MCF for further assistance, leading to the approval of a grant covering 100% of the remaining renovation costs due to their unique circumstances. With renewed hope, Daniel and Clare are eager to return to their beloved home, expressing immense gratitude to the Suffolk Almoners and MCF for their invaluable support throughout this arduous journey.

Isolation amongst older people set to reduce thanks to Suffolk Freemasons

Rural Suffolk's older population will begin to feel more connected, thanks to a grant of £15,000 from Suffolk Freemasons to the Rural Coffee Caravan (RCC). This substantial grant aims to address the growing issue of rural isolation among individuals over 65 in Suffolk, where dwindling services, lack of public transport, and limited online access exacerbate the problem. The Age UK Loneliness map highlights pockets of



high and very high risk of loneliness across Suffolk, underscoring the urgent need for initiatives like the one led by the RCC. The organisation's innovative approach involves a mobile community cafe and information centre, operated by a roving caravan and three campervans, where they can reach out to remote communities. The RCC provides tea and cake, a warm and friendly atmosphere, and valuable signposting to support services. Moreover, the RCC fosters community connections through initiatives such as 'More Than A Shop', encouraging local stores to become hubs of friendship and connection. Importantly, RCC ensures these events are accessible to all, offering them free of charge to encourage widespread participation.

In 2022, the RCC made over 200 village visits throughout Suffolk, welcoming more than 5,000 visitors. Despite challenges posed by the pandemic, their 'Meet Up Mondays' initiative reached an impressive throughput of 20,000 participants. The heart of RCC's success lies in the meaningful relationships it nurtures among rural residents. In November 2023, the RCC won a European Social Services Award for Service Delivery. The theme of the Awards this year, was 'Person Centred Care'. The only UK organisation shortlisted in this category, the RCC was able to showcase their work demonstrating that simple acts of kindness have blossomed into robust social networks, transforming these rural areas into vibrant, connected communities. The grant from Suffolk Freemasons comes through the Masonic Charitable Foundation, funded by Freemasons, their families, and their friends from across England, Wales and the Channel Islands.

Ann Osborn from the RCC said: "Thanks to the generous support of Suffolk Freemasons, we are able to continue to address isolation across rural Suffolk and help older people connect with each other. We know how much our community benefit from our services, and we look forward to supporting people in the years to come." Jon Neill added: "I'm very pleased we're able to help RCC and support the important work they are doing for older people in Suffolk. Their approach provide much-needed support to older people who are feeling isolated from their community and helps bring them together."

February Craft Seminars/Workshops Recap

I held three successful Craft Seminars/Workshops in Lowestoft, Sudbury, and Ipswich in February. These full-day events were well-received by brethren keen to advance their Masonic knowledge and those interested in presenting learning and development in their lodges.

Key Discussions

- Unlocking the Power of UGLE's Solomon: Although most attendees were aware of Solomon, it was disappointing to find that very few lodges use this valuable resource to present Masonic information during Lodge meetings. It was agreed that more lodges need to incorporate Solomon into their educational activities. Perhaps invite new members to share a brief piece of wisdom from Solomon during any pauses in the ceremony, such as while we wait for the candidate to return. We can never stop learning, regardless of how long we have been members.
- Revitalising the Lodge of Instruction: Many brethren expressed that their Lodge of Instruction sessions needed to be more enlightening. Many attendees felt that we solely focus on practising the ritual. The vast treasury of Masonic knowledge on Solomon including ceremony explanations, ritual insights, tracing board interpretations, historical accounts, and more, remains untapped and never discussed at Lol. It's time to bring this treasure trove of Solomon to life and present it at your lodges of Instruction.

Survey Insights

A revealing survey by UGLE Solomon, with over 80,000 responses from Freemasons, highlighted that 68% of respondents regard history, traditions, symbolism, and moral/philosophical issues as crucial. This powerful insight underscores the need for all lodges to embrace Masonic knowledge and understanding of our rituals and to establish an educational framework.

Secretary and Bagman Dave Pring explains 'May Morning Capers'

As well as being Secretary of Lodge Prince of Wales 959 I am Bagman of Rumburgh Morris, which is a mixed-sex 'side' as Morris Dance groups are



known, formed in 2008, dancing Cotswold Morris. It is based in the village of Rumburgh, Suffolk, with The Buck public house as headquarters. are held in the village hall at St. Margaret South Elmham.

At 5 am on the 1st May we met at the Ditchingham Village Hall, about 2 miles from Bungay, Suffolk. Processing slowly and quietly towards the Long Barrow, an ancient monument located on the wide open common. The temperature was around freezing (after all, the sun hadn't risen yet!) and the crisp frosty ground resembled the Tundra in Greenland.

And so to work! First up was a dance for eight called Sweet Jenny Jones (Adderbury tradition) just to get the bones moving and the blood pumping. With just our tunics on it felt even colder! The sun made its appearance in spectacular form, the red light glinting on the frosty ground. Swiftly we performed several other dances as the sun climbed orange-red spectacularly through the cold sky, our performance culminating in Old Woman Tossed Up (Long Fieldtown).

By then we could just perceive some solar warmth, and we were nearly ready for breakfast at the Buttercross café, Bungay. The first mug of hot tea at 06:30 was a lifesaver, returning blue hands, lips and probably feet back into the familiar flesh tones we are used to! Breakfasts were duly served and consumed, and we departed to our various corners of Suffolk for a well-earned rest, but very pleased that we welcomed in the May in the traditional way, and gave our thanks to those frozen souls who were waiting on the common to see us dance.

It is unclear as to when Morris Dancing began to be performed, though there is evidence that this dance has existed for several centuries, the earliest reference being from the year 1448. It has also been claimed that the dance is so ancient that its origins have been lost in the mists of time. The name is said to have been derived from the word 'Moorish' or 'Morisco' (a derogatory term meaning 'little Moors'), although it is uncertain if this was the original name for the dance. Nonetheless, during the late Middle Ages, Morris dancers were occasionally referred to as 'morisco dancers.

Believed to have been once widespread throughout England, it had largely died out during the 19th century until remnants were collected by Cecil Sharp in the early 20th century in the villages on the uplands of Gloucestershire, Oxfordshire and Northamptonshire. Each village produced its own steps and dances, and these have become the 'traditions', known by the name of the parent village.





Mildenhall Masons to the rescue



When Trevor Manville heard that the West Suffolk Hospital Dialysis Unit at Bury St. Edmunds needed a new ultra sound scanner he galvanised Mildenhall Lodge members and their families to raise funds for the new equipment. After a successful year they had raised £3686 which met the cost of the new scanner in full.

Anyone on Haemodialysis knows just how essential an ultrasound scanner is, not only in cannulation but also in detecting other fistula related issues. The new scanner is something of a departure from the rather cumbersome and ailing kit the dialysis unit had previously. The new scanner is highly portable, far more practical and the the connection between transducer probe and screen is wireless. Moreover the images are clearer and can be in colour to differentiate the cannulation needle from surrounding tissue. With the right software the probe can even be used in conjunction with a smartphone. It's not widely known but for those with kidney failure in the Bury St Edmunds area the West Suffolk Hospital Dialysis Unit delivers over 250 literally life saving dialysis sessions every week of the year. The unit operates from 7.30 am to at least 10.30 pm six days a week. As a dialysis patient myself I can attest to the excellent treatment and unstinting care of the highly professional and caring team of nurses at the facility. A facility which is under pressure from the ever increasing numbers of individuals requiring Dialysis.

Abbot Baldwin: Monk, Physician, Spy?

Abbot Baldwin was believed to have been born in the city of Chartres in the early to middle of the 11th Century. He entered the Orders at st Denis and grew acclaimed as a physician. He trained as a physician in Alsace before at some unknown point moving to England and entering the court of King Edward the Confessor. Serving as the Kings personal physician and a trusted confidante.

In 1065, Edward rewarded Baldwin by making him the Abbot of Bury st Edmunds. The Abbey was fairly new, only having been built in 1020 by Cnut as reparations for the death of st Edmund, King of East Anglia and Patron saint of England. This was a prestigious appointment at the time and esteemed as one of the key religious sites in England. Edward also installed a Royal Mint in Bury to be overseen by Baldwin.



As part of his duties, the Abbot helped raise military forces for the King to fight off invaders, especially Danes. Once Edward died, Harold Godwinson was elected King but suffered from challenges from many angles. Abbot Baldwin again helped by raising a levy to assist in repelling the invasions from Tostig, Harolds brother who wanted to be King, Harold Hardrada, the Viking King and finally William of Normandy. William I eventually succeeded in taking the throne finally in December 1066.

Once William ascended the throne, he installed Normans loyal to himself in all positions of authority. He did not, however replace Baldwin as Abbot of Bury st Edmunds. In fact, he retained him in his role as Abbot as well as re-appointing him as Royal Physician.

When all the previous Anglo-Saxon nobles had been deposed, William kept the one Frenchman in his key role. Many have speculated on why this could be. Was he secretly acting in the best interests of the Norman and French courts? Was he secretly spying for William? Most likely, it was his fame and ability as a healer. A good physician who faithfully served a monarch would be a desired man. Fidelity is always a trait everyman aspires to be and holds as a virtue. The fact that Baldwin did serve as advisor, physician and confidant to 3 Kings (Edward, William and then William II Rufus) reveals the esteem he was kept in. A man of true morals and virtues.

In 1071, Baldwin made a trip to Rome to besiege the Pope, Alexander II, to intercede on his behalf on the plans of Herfast, Bishop of Thetford. Herfast wished to move his seat to Bury and assume authority of the Abbey and district. This would include the holy relics, pilgrimages, and Mint. The Pope agreed. He presented Baldwin with a Crozier, ring and an altar made of porphyry. He made the demesne of Bury to be under the Abbots control on behalf of the Holy See. William I then set a charter confirming this.

The affluence and fame of Bury grew further under his leadership. Bury had become one of the central locations for pilgrimage within England. In 1081 Baldwin then laid out his plan to build the Abbey up. Stone was purchased, to be transported free of charge from Northamptonshire, for the Masons hired to build a new large Abbey church. The finished church was to be the largest Romanesque church in Northern Europe. The finished church could then house the relics of st Edmund in glory. In 1095, under Baldwins supervision, the Bishop of Winchester interred st Edmund into the new church behind the altar.

Baldwin eventually died in 1097. Following his death the King did not immediately select a replacement. It was not till Henry I that a permanent Abbot was installed. William Rufus was reported to have had a good relationship with Baldwin to the extent that William was reported to have taken Baldwins favourite oath as his own. The oath, "by the face of Lucca" was from the Holy Face of Lucca, a relic held in the cathedral of Lucca which Baldwin had visited and maintained good relations with. Baldwin even sent relics from Bury to Lucca to be venerated.

Even after his death Baldwin was regarded as an honourable and pious man. He was trusted by Kings, Popes, and freemen. He embodied the ideals of a virtuous man who held fidelity to its highest level. Truly an exemplar of what a Freemason aspires to be.
